Extract from Kelly's Directory -1914 Woodford

Woodford (near Thrapston) is a village and parish on the Nene, 1 mile south- east from Twywell station on the Kettering and Cambridge branch of the Midland Railway 3 miles south-west from Thrapston, 7 east from Kettering, 7 north from Higham Ferrers and 72 from London in the Northern division of the county, hundred of Huxloe, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Thrapston, rural deanery of Higham Ferrers (second portion), archdeaconry of Oakham and diocese of Peterborough. Water Works were completed in 1902 by the Urban District Council of Thrapston, the cost being defrayed from the rates.

The church of St. Mary the Virgin is a large building of stone, in the early English and later styles, consisting of chancel, nave with clerestory, aisles, north and south porches and a western tower with four pinnacles and spire, and containing 6 bells; in 1913 the old bells were rehung and the sixth added: the east window and those on the south side of the chancel are stained: there is also a window erected in 1913, in memory of the Rev J T Watson MA Rector 1884 - 1911. At the east end of the north aisle are two very curious recumbent wooden effigies conjectured to represent Sir Walter de Trayly, or Treylli, 1290, and Alianora, his wife AD 1316; there is also a brass with effigy and inscription, to Simon Malory the elder esq. ob 1580 the church was restored in the year 1867 at a cost of £2340 under the direction of Mr. William Slater, architect, of Northampton and in the same year the chancel was restored, at a cost of £1009 under the direction of Mr. Fowler architect; since then nearly £1000 has been spent on repairs. and in 1896 a stained window was erected in memory of Mrs Plevins, of Woodford House: during the restoration of the church a box containing the remains or a human heart wrapped in cloth was found inclosed within one of the columns of the north arcade of the nave, but there was nothing to show to whom it had belonged. The register dates from the year 1680. The living is a rectory net yearly value from 360 acres of glebe £300, with residence, in the gift of Lord St. John, and held since 1911 by the Rev. Gerard Markby Davidson MA of Clare College Cambridge.

There are Baptist and Wesleyan Methodist chapels. A Temperance hall was built in 1883, at a cost of £500 for lectures and entertainments and will hold 200 persons. Shoemaking is carried on largely by the villagers for the manufacturers of the neighbouring towns. The charity estate of about 39 acres produces £100 yearly, which is principally expended in fuel for the poor. The church land of about 15 acres, together with mine rents, produces £108 yearly for church repairs: there are small charities of about £2 for distribution.

Woodford House, the property of Wilfred Maurice Plevins esq. JP is a pleasant mansion surrounded by well-wooded pleasure grounds, and is about 2 miles west of the village. George Stopford-Sackville esq. DL JP of Drayton House, Lowick who is lord of the manor, and W M Plevins esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is clay; subsoil, clay and ironstone. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and beans and meadow land.

The area is 2133 acres; rateable value £4613 the population in 1911 was 1,505.
